THOUGHTS ON THE FUTURE OF THE ASSOCIATION

On Friday 11th February, a cheerful happy crowd of nearly 60 citizens wended their way home from the Town Hall after a very successful regular meeting. The programme was purposely planned by the committee in charge to be as informal as possible so that all members would get an opportunity to meet each other and welcome new members. All will agree that the plan was highly successful, and many have since expressed their pleasure at the success of the meeting. But what are the thoughts that come to our mindes after such a meeting? Firstly, that meetings will get bigger and better, secondly that we have an urgent need of more chairs, a piano, and in time, more space. Obviously, we can have none of these without money. Could we not, therefore, draw up an approximate budget of what we need this year, and find the cost with voluntary contributions from all citizens? Perhaps a minimum of 50cents a month from each family would give the required amount. This could be paid in a lump sum for the whole year, or in any way convenient. Some members might feel moved to give a larger sum, feeling that this Association is definitely filling a need and giving a valuable service to the Town. It could be so arranged that only the Treasurer would know the amounts donated, so that we need not be embarrassed if our contribution is small. For two years now, many citizens have enabled us to provide a Christmas Party by their generosity. In the future this could be covered by the one fund, so that no further appeals would be needed. Let us consider what we may expect to pay out as a minimum from our family budget: Say, Christmas Farty \$2.00


4 money-raising parties @ \$1.00 per couple 4.00 Making cake for cooking sale .50 Buying back cakes from sale 1.50 \$8.00

and there might easily be many more money raising activities which would increase the bill. Under a scheme of voluntary donations all recreation would be free to all members of the Association. Guests would be admitted at a small charge (sometimes guest fees cover the cost of such things as prizes). There would be not tickets to sell, no money to collect at parties thus making the work of the Recreation Committee much easier and doing away with the chances that some activities might not make enough money to be worth while. Provision would have to be made for the entertainment of older members, such as card parties, old time waltzes, etc. If we should attempt this scheme for this year it would be fully understood that any future executive would be free to guide the Association in their own way.
